

New Dimensions

Since Richard Strauss loved the full orchestra, this recording of "smaller-scale" chamber music by this late-romantic composer is all the more unique. The Leipzig String Quartet and musicians of like mind present the String Sextet from the opera *Capriccio*, the String Quartet op. 2, and the famous Metamorphoses in its early version for string septet — all well worth a close hearing!

Young Master

The String Quartet in A major op. 2, composed by the schoolboy Strauss in 1880 at the age of fifteen or sixteen, numbers among the works of his youth. What do experts find in this music by the composer as a young man? Beautiful melodies fitting the character of the movements, challenging but not too virtuosic instrumental parts, a quartet texture of remarkably good construction, and what in fact is a brilliant command of form!

Time Machine

Six years later Strauss opened *Capriccio*, his last opera, with a string sextet in the classical mold. This is hardly surprising inasmuch as the opera is set in a castle in the vicinity of Paris, where, at the same time, Gluck began his reform of the opera — a genuine "Strauss" from 1775.

Compositional Phases

Strauss composed the *Metamorphoses* five years later, at the end of World War II, and changed its instrumentation a number of times. He initially planned eleven stringed instruments, reduced the instrumental contingent to seven voices in the particella (the version heard here), and then finally and definitively expanded it to twenty-three voices in the score. The composer's mourning over the destruction of

his native Munich gave rise to an atmospheric picture of great density and one that is represented particularly well in the transparency of the intermediary phase recorded here.

New Combinations

On this recording the Leipzig String Quartet teams up with three musicians representing the same high interpretive standards. Since Hartmut Rohde (viola), Michael Sanderling (violoncello), and Christian Ockert (double bass) number among Europe's most successful chamber musicians, we have every reason to expect that this recording will continue in the tradition of the Leipzig String Quartet's previous MDG triumphs.
