Cycle A History

Our History curriculum at Limehurst is a bespoke curriculum created using the Historical Association schemes of work as well as local history studies linked to our local area. Our curriculum demonstrates strong links between different areas of history and ensures children are equipped with both substantive and disciplinary knowledge in each of the units they study. Through our scheme they develop a strong understanding of chronology. Our units are enquiry-led and the children begin each unit by being introduced to the main enquiry. Through historical investigations, the skills of enquiry, source analysis, interpretation and problem-solving, the children's understanding of history is challenged and developed. Our curriculum is strongly linked to the aims of the National Curriculum and ensures progression for all children.

EYFS Overview	Understanding the world involves guiding children to make sense of their community. The frequency and range of children's personal experiences increases their knowledge and sense of the world around them – from visiting parks, libraries, and museums to meeting important members of society such as police officers, nurses and firefighters. In addition, listening to a broad selection of stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems will foster their understanding of our culturally, socially, technologically and ecologically diverse world. As well as building important knowledge, this extends their familiarity with words that support understanding across domains. Begin to make sense of their own life-story and family's history. Remembers and talks about significant events in their own experience. Knows some of the things which make them unique. Talks about past and present events in their own lives and the lives of their family members. Talks about how the local area/environment has changed over time.
